

Gay Pride Parade Sunday, June 29

Two representatives are being sought by the CPUC Outreach Ministry to represent us as part of the UCC delegation at the parade in Minneapolis. Early in March, past participants were notified that the parade would no longer be available to sign-up on a first-come basis, but instead, all groups who wished to participate would have to submit a theme to be evaluated with all other applicants.

The UCC application was accepted based on the theme, "It's Just Love," highlighting the work towards the next steps in achieving full LGBT equality throughout America. The float will be decorated in pink with a map showing the strides already taken to establish full LGBT equality in America. Participants will wear pink shirts with the same logo on the front. The float will carry a live band performing selections of mainly 60's-era folk, light rock, and spiritual music. Marchers will follow handing out stickers that

say, "It's Just Love," and carry signs representing each Open and Affirming UCC, highlighting the year that church became ONA.



The first volunteers from each congregation may carry their home church sign, but additional marchers will be asked to help represent other churches that do not have a member present. If you are interested please contact

Minnesota Conference UCC

STRANGERS NO MORE (EPHESIANS 2:19) is the theme of the 52nd annual meeting to be held June 13 -15 at the College of St. Benedict. Pastor Tim, Andy Barnett and Herbert Perkins will be attending as our delegates. Joanne Sylvander will be present as a member of the UCC Immigration Justice Taskforce. Kathryn Price also plans to attend part of the Conference. Rev. Michael Owens will be the guest preacher at Cherokee Park United Church.

This year Rev. Shari Prestemon will be welcomed as our new Conference Minister. The theme recognizes our connectedness with all God's people and invites us to consider ways of welcoming those who may seem distant, whether global partners or the 'stranger' in our own community.

Keynote speaker will be the Rev. James Moos, Executive Director of Wider Church Ministries, United Church of Christ, who will speak on Saturday morning and offer a workshop. Representatives from our global partner organization, the United Church of Christ in the Philippines, will preach on Sunday morning. Special music and worship planning will be provided by Dr. Patrick Evans, lecturer, practitioner, and clinician in the field of global/sacred music. Bible study on Saturday and Sunday mornings will be led by Dr. Carolyn Pressler, Old Testament professor at the United Theological Seminary.

Cherokee Park United Church will be presenting a resolution to the conference delegates entitled "Dismantling Racism and Creating Diversity in the Minnesota Conference." The resolution originates from Cherokee Park United Church with the support of the Antiracism Team and the Church Council. Co-sponsors of the resolution include Peace UCC in Rochester and Peace UCC in Duluth.

Respectful Conversations on the Stained Glass Jesus

If you had missed the April gathering or wish to participate again, you are invited Tuesday, June 17, 6 – 9:30 to share in this conversation. **We will begin with a full meal and child-care will be provided** for any who request it. Conversations will occur around the tables in Fellowship Hall, with facilitators trained by the primary Minnesota Council facilitator, so that everyone has the opportunity to both speak and be heard. “Respectful Conversations” is a thoughtful model for community conversation developed by the Minnesota Council of Churches, with the support of a Bush Foundation Grant. This model was initially developed to help facilitate healthy conversations leading up to the vote on the state marriage amendment. It is not the intention of this model to influence a particular outcome, but rather to create safe spaces for people to talk with those with differing viewpoints in order to create empathy and understanding while maintaining and even enhancing relationships. The model is very valuable in situations where people potentially have strongly-held views that differ. People who have participated in the process have reported better listening skills, more interest in other people’s opinions, and better relationships as lasting results of the conversation.

The Stained Glass Jesus Taskforce has been given the charge of addressing our



Jesus window by looking at art as a medium for explicit and implicit values, how the white racial frame functions in art, how class functions in art, whether this stained glass window reflects the present values, theology, mission and vision of Cherokee Park United Church. The taskforce has been given the twin responsibility of facilitating discussion that builds community while growing in our understanding and commitment to antiracism.
