
New Member Profile - Meliza Thurstin

Council Corner Highlights — Meeting of April 20, 2017

- A Congregational Meeting will be held on Sunday, May 7, 2017 after worship to vote on the nomination of Jerry Williams to fill the vacancy on Council. The position is open from Glen Herrington-Hall's recent resignation and lasts through 2018.
- There will be a meeting of the Ministry Team Chair people on May 18 at church. A
 potluck meal will be shared at 6 pm and the meeting will be at 7 pm. All Ministry
 Chairs (or a representative) are encouraged to attend. Please bring calendars and
 plans for upcoming months.
- A special collection to support Tom and Monica Liddle and their ministry in East Timor will be taken in May. We pledged \$1,500 for several years and are eager to fulfill that promise. A Sunday will be designated, but you can submit your contribution, with proper notation on your check's memo line, anytime in May.
- After hearing from Tomie Evans about the Citizen's Climate Lobby Carbon Fee and Dividend proposal, the Council voted for CPUC to endorse this plan to Congress. He will share more information about this in the church newsletter and on our website soon.
- The Transition Team presented a detailed To-Do List for our process of moving towards creating a Church Profile and calling a new minister. The Council affirmed the plan. The Transition Team will be sharing this information with the congregation soon.
- The financial reports show a decrease in giving in the last month. We are about \$3,000 behind our first quarter projections. If you need to reduce your pledge or are deferring giving until later this year, please let folks on the Finance Team know. Thank you for your faithful stewardship towards CPUC.



Council leadership remains grateful for the prayers and participation of the people of CPUC during this transitional period. Please connect with council members or Pastor Joy with ideas or feedback you'd like to share as we strive to live out God's will together.

Google Calendar Guru

If you have not yet had a lesson in using the church calendar posted on Google, our own calendar guru, Josh Welter, is happy to assist you. The goal is to give access to all so you can see what spaces are available for your future meetings or events and if you desire this option, to put them on the calendar to hold your spot. This will prevent double bookings and prevent many last minute changes in plans. We may have a "small" church, but we have lots going on, and our mission also is to make our spaces available to the community and others who are trying to create a better world.

- 1. a: If you already have a Google account or are on GMail, contact Josh so he can add you to the list of people able to access this calendar.
- 1. b: If you want to just use a different email, first establish a Google account at https://accounts.google.com/signup and click on "I prefer to use my own e-mail address" then contact Josh so he can add you to the CPUC calendar list.
- 2. Once Josh registers you, you will receive an email verifying that you want to be connected; click on that link that says "add calendar".
- 3. To access the calendar from an internet browser (not on a tablet or phone app), log on to your Google account, look for the nine dots in the upper right corner, click on that, click on Calendar, and then on the left border, click on CPUC. The > at the top will cycle you through to future weeks. To reserve a space, click on the day and time you want, and type in the box the name of your event. Click on "create" and if you want to add/change any information click on "edit" to do so.

If you want to bring your laptop (or your phone which is a different process), Josh is happy to set up a time to help you during fellowship hour after worship. CPUC Members' Energy Consumption Reduction

Last month's newsletter gave a synopsis of an energy consumption report from Enerchange, a company which gave us a free analysis after spending many hours inside and outside our building and then doing their engineering computations. They listed all the places we might save energy as well as the potential savings per year and the amount of time it would take to accumulate any payback of expenditure. One item, requiring no upfront expense, is to "engage the congregation to reduce the consumption of energy on a continuing basis".

We may think we can relax now that our solar panels are producing our own electricity. However, we still want to maintain as small a carbon footprint as possible for the good of all earth and its peoples, AND, a wonderful plus is that when we produce more than we use (or use less than we produce), we can sell the excess back to Xcel and add to our income column. Lynne and the Finance Committee always manage to come up with a balanced budget but cannot perform miracles!

Some of these items may seem SO obvious, yet, we are not doing them, and so, wasting energy. Probably our "Minnesota Nice" tells us it's not nice to turn off lights if someone else might want to come into a room, but that is counterproductive. Here is a simple **request** from the Property Management Ministry. When leaving a room that is empty, **turn off all the lights.** Don't worry if you think someone else might come in - they can turn them back on. This includes the

- downstairs Rainbow room classroom
- stage (switch is hidden behind blue screen on left you can stick your hand in behind the curtain from the main floor)
- Fellowship Hall (The middle column of lights in Fellowship Hall is also turned off by the switch at the top of the Baker Street steps if you are on your way out at night.)
- kitchen
- nursery
- Parent Room
- upstairs big meeting/classroom
- worship space (light switches are near the piano), the lights above the altar (switch is behind liturgist's chair go on, climb the stairs - you can do it!!)
- church office
- music office (office next to the church office)
- upper and lower halls

On occasion at 1:00 p.m. on Sundays we will find no one in any of these rooms but one, but *all* the lights are still on.
