
Women's Group

Please join us for a timely discussion about caring for the earth and faith. Wendell Berry's book, *Our Only World – Ten Essays*, will be the focus of the Adult

The planet's environmental problems respect no national boundaries. From soil erosion and population displacement to climate change and failed energy policies, American governing classes are paid by corporations to pretend that debate is the only democratic necessity and that solutions are capable of withstanding endless delay. Late Capitalism goes about its business of finishing off the planet, and we citizens are left with a shell of what was once proudly described as The American Dream. In this new collection of eleven essays, Berry confronts head-on the necessity of clear thinking and direct action. Never one to ignore the present challenge, he understands that only clearly stated questions support the understanding their answers require. For more than fifty years we've had no better spokesman and no more eloquent advocate for the planet, for our families, and for the future of our children and ourselves.

Building Blocks Tutorial to End after Twenty-Seven Years



In February, the church council, acting on a recommendation from the Building Blocks Ministry Team, voted to end this long-standing program of Cherokee Park United after this school year. It took much thought, discussion, prayer, and hard work to reach the decision. The program is hoping to end its twenty-seven year history on an upbeat note. There is much to celebrate considering the positive impact Building Blocks has made on countless people in our community and beyond for over a quarter-century.

The reasons for the decision are many. The structural changes forced upon the program by the school district the past few years have made it hard to fulfill our mission as in the past. The change from three to two days per week, the move to the school, and the shortened district calendar has impacted the program in major ways. Recent funding challenges lead to new money-raising efforts but no new on-going sources of dollars. With other administrative and unknown challenges ahead, it seems the time has come to conclude this very special community program.

The contributions of Cherokee Park United members to make this program possible are countless. Thanks to everyone for all the ways you've supported Building Blocks – tutoring, serving on the ministry team, helping with special events and snacks, donating dollars, praying, bookkeeping, and grant-writing. Building Blocks is an example of a rare "win, win, win" situation. It enhances the lives of its students and their families and schools, the amazing volunteers who tutor, and the people and ministries of Cherokee Park United Church. The spirit embodied in Building Blocks will have ripples in our community for a long time to come.

The program will end with its annual Awards Dinner for this year's students and their families and tutors on May 7. The church is planning a farewell celebration for church and community friends in late May. Stay tuned for news on that very special event. Please join us as we give thanks for the learning and friendship that have been the hallmark of Building Blocks Tutorial. As our mascot BB says, this ministry has been a very mooooving experience for all.

1862-1863 Concentration Camp of 1,600 Dakota interned at Fort Snelling – (women, children, elders)

Edwin Schenk (Lac View Desert Ojibwa/Cheyenne River Sioux) is Director of the T.J. Jones Library at North Central University and holds a Master of Arts degree in Old Testament from Luther Seminary in Saint Paul, Minnesota. Edwin is a convert to Pentecostal Christianity who has roots in traditional Lakota life.

Dr. Chris Mato Nunpa is a Dakota Elder and retired Associate Professor of Indigenous Nations & Dakota Studies at Southwest Minnesota State University. He is currently finishing his first book titled - WOSICA TANKA KIN, "THE GREAT EVIL": GENOCIDE, THE BIBLE, AND THE INDIGENOUS PEOPLES OF THE UNITED STATES

Dr. Jack Nelson-Pallmeyer is an associate professor who teaches justice and peace studies at the University of St. Thomas in St. Paul. He has written more than a dozen books, including Jesus Against Christianity, Violence in the Bible and the Quran; and Saving Christianity from Empire.
