

The Twin Cities observance of the 1965 Selma March begins at the State Capitol and ends at Central Presbyterian Church in downtown Saint Paul.

Adult Forum

Sundays, March 1 through 22, 9:00-10:00 a.m.

This month's forum will be a four-session, video-based small group Bible study by New York Times best-selling author Eric Metaxas. The focus is the major themes of Dietrich Bonhoeffer's writing and speaking and how he not only helped transform an entire faith community in Germany during World War II, but how his beliefs continue to impact the Christian faith of people throughout the



world today. Filmed on location in Germany, Metaxas will take us on a journey of Bonhoeffer's faith and why it has captured so many people's imaginations and how it has inspired the Christian faith of so many today. Metaxas helps us understand why these spiritual truths meant so much to Bonhoeffer and how they can be an inspiration and challenge to our faith. Sessions include: What is the Church?, Life Together, God Says Yes/Cheap Grace, and Religionless Christianity.

A handwritten letter to elected officials is one of the most powerful ways to act for justice. The Justice and Witness Ministry hosts a simple meal, a brief time of worship and a chance for you to write letters about justice issues that are on your heart.

Each Wednesday there will be resources available focused on a particular justice theme. February 25 focuses on environmental justice with resources from

Minnesota Interfaith Power and Light, March 4 focuses on economic justice, March 11 on advocacy issues from Joint Religious Legislative Advocacy, March 18 on immigration justice, and March 25 open to all issues. People are also invited to write letters of advocacy for any other concerns to which they feel called.

Celebrating the life of Archbishop Oscar Romero Saturday and Sunday, March 21-22

We will recognize the 35th Anniversary of the Resurrection of Archbishop Oscar Romero with events on both Saturday and Sunday. On Saturday, from **6:30-8:30 p.m.**, "Meeting the Martyr – Oscar Romero" will be presented, in which we will learn why the Roman Catholic Church has recognized Romero as a martyr, a significant step toward sainthood, and discover the story behind the Misa Popular Salvadorean which provides the musical structure for the People's Mass.

Pastor Porfirio Martinez will return from his recent visit to El Salvador with a copy of a new film created by Fr. Angel Renderos Diaz of the Romero Foundation, in preparation of the celebration of the 100th anniversary of Romero's birth to be held in 2017. Padre Angel is the much-loved El Salvadoran priest who worked with Mons. Romero and visited us last year. Also, he plans to join us by Skype on Sunday during lunch...with his guitar! We anticipate seeing excerpts from his film as



well as Pastor Porfirio's own account of the events that led to the assassination of Archbishop Romero and why we now celebrate his resurrection.

At our regular Sunday worship service, music of the Misa Popular Salvadorena will be provided by El Espiritu del Milagro and the CPUC choir. Our preacher for the day will be The Rev. Don Christensen. Pastor Porfirio Martinez and Pastor Tim Johnson will officiate at a special Communion service. The whole service will be given in Spanish and English.

Following worship there will be a fund- raising lunch of Salvadoran chicken and rice, salad and dessert. The suggested donation is \$8 and proceeds will be donated to support the Communidades Construyendo Esperanza (Communities Building Hope) partnership with our brothers and sisters in Ostuma, El Salvador.

Please extend a hearty invitation to family, friends, neighbors – anyone who wishes to learn about and celebrate the remarkable life of Archbishop Oscar Romero.

The Day on the Hill Saturday March 10

Joint Religious Legislative Coalition's annual policy briefing and lobby day starts at 8:30 a.m. at the River Center in downtown St. Paul. Clergy and lay people from across the state attend Day on the Hill to show their interfaith commitment to social justice and to participate in the lawmaking process.



Participants gather in the morning for inspiration and issue briefings on what is being debated and voted on at our State Capitol. Meetings are held with legislators at the Capitol complex in the afternoon. Buses shuttle between RiverCentre and the Capitol until 4:00 p.m.

The theme, "Dignity in Democracy", will be addressed in a keynote presentation by Joan Rosenhauer, Executive Vice President of U.S. Operations for Catholic Relief Services. Joan leads their domestic programs and advocacy— faith-based actions that bring the agency's work with those in need overseas into the lives of people in the United States.

Our Communion Cloth


Children will experience a communion preparation on Sunday, March 8, 9:00-10:00 a.m. in Sandy's class. Any older children, whether or not they already are receiving communion, and parents, are also welcome.

Newer members joining this church may notice the colorful altar cloth that appears on the first Sunday of the month communion service during worship. This is a wonderful piece of history, which is shared at the communion preparation class. In 1999 members were invited to submit pieces of material that were meaningful to their families. Quilting squares were cut from these 83 pieces, and assembled to represent our coming together as one through God's welcome and love. Pieces celebrated ethnic heritages, military service, life-changing experiences of travels, hobbies, and deceased loved ones. They included pieces of baby blankets, a wedding gown made over for a daughter-in-law, needlework done by great-grandmothers, and a beloved pet's blanket (now laundered). The explanations and sample pieces are all found in a blue 3 ring binder on the shelves in fellowship hall to the left of the stage.

Edwin Schenk (Lac View Desert Ojibwa/Cheyenne River Sioux) is Director of the T.J. Jones Library at North Central University and holds a Master of Arts degree in Old Testament from Luther Seminary in Saint Paul, Minnesota. Edwin is a convert to Pentecostal Christianity who has roots in traditional Lakota life.

Dr. Chris Mato Nunpa is a Dakota Elder and retired Associate Professor of Indigenous Nations & Dakota Studies at Southwest Minnesota State University. He is currently finishing his first book titled - WOSICA TANKA KIN, "THE GREAT EVIL": GENOCIDE, THE BIBLE, AND THE INDIGENOUS PEOPLES OF THE UNITED STATES

Dr. Jack Nelson-Pallmeyer is an associate professor who teaches justice and peace studies at the University of St. Thomas in St. Paul. He has written more than a dozen books, including Jesus Against Christianity, Violence in the Bible and the Quran; and Saving Christianity from Empire.
