Children and Youth Sunday School

First Sundays - Families Exploring Spirituality - The Faith Life Ministry is providing a creative opportunity for parents, grandparents, and children to learn about our Christian faith together. The first, on February 3, will be focused on understanding Communion, where it came from, why we do it, what it can mean. This will be led by Sandy Dodson and Susan Strebig from 9-10 a.m. in Fellowship Hall. Children must be accompanied by an adult, and this will also be an opportunity for parents to get to know one another. (Coffee pot will be on!)

Second and Third Sundays - Sunday School Classes - For now there will be two age groups (grades K-3) focused on Bible stories and (grades 4-7) focused on Scripture lessons with a connection to justice ministries of the church.

Fourth Sundays - Making Music in Church - Jen Folkers and Andy Barnett will be introducing children and youth to music that will be part of the morning worship service that day. Music time will be from 9:15 – 9:45 a.m. in Fellowship Hall. You are welcome to bring your child/ren at 9:00 a.m. Pastor Tim will be there to welcome them and be with them until the time begins. At 9:45 they will be invited to find a game in the Kid's Corner. We welcome parent volunteers to help with this time before worship begins.

Intergenerational Events - Approximately once a month we will continue having a Wednesday evening intergenerational event from 5:30 – 7:30 p.m. beginning with pizza. On February 27th our gathering will focus on the story of Ruby Bridges, a 6-year old who was on the front line of the civil rights struggle. There is an opportunity to experience this story beforehand at the Steppingstone Theatre Saturday, February 9th at 3 p.m. ~ we have discounted tickets available. The story will be retold on the 27th as a review and for those unable to attend the play **Ruby!**




Children Leading Adults



The Communion Cloth

New members joining this church may notice the colorful altar cloth that appears at the first Sunday of the month communion service during worship. This is a wonderful piece of history which will be shared at the *Family Exploring Spirituality* Sunday School offering on February 3. In 1999 members were invited to submit pieces of material that were meaningful to their families. Quilting squares were cut from these 83 pieces, and assembled to represent our coming together as one through God's welcome and love. Pieces celebrated ethnic heritages, military service, life-changing experiences of travels, hobbies, and deceased loved ones. They included pieces of baby blankets, a wedding gown made over for a daughter-in-law, needlework done by great-grandmothers, and a beloved pet's blanket (now laundered). Cherokee Park United Church Annual Leader's Retreat Celtic Christianity: Its Significance for Today

Friday & Saturday, February 22 & 23 ~ ARC Ecumenical Retreat Center

Focus: We will explore the question: "How might Celtic Christianity more fully inform and be an inspiration for our life together as a community of faith at Cherokee Park United Church and in our own personal spiritual journeys?" On Friday evening Pastor Tim will again share the Celtic journey he and Michele took this past summer to Ireland and Scotland. The cross in the chancel of Cherokee Park United Church is a Celtic cross made by former members. The Scottish Presbyterian Church was the source for modern day renewal in Celtic Christian traditions. Building on these connections we will look in greater depth at core values and beliefs found in the Celtic tradition asking questions about their relevance for worship, ministry and a life or prayer and service at Cherokee Park United. Pastor Tim will share excerpts from many of the readings he did while on sabbatical as a starting point for conversation.

Each participant will receive a copy of *Celtic Benediction* by John Phillip Newell, one of the foremost experts on Celtic spirituality. This collection of newly written daily prayers draws on the rich stream of devotion flowing deep in the Celtic tradition.

Location: The ARC Retreat Center is a wonderful old lodge in a beautiful wooded setting in Stanchfield, near Cambridge, Minnesota. It is known for superb vegetarian cooking! Linens are provided.

Fellowship and relaxation: There will be time for hiking on the grounds and casual relaxation alone or with others.

Who should attend: Council members, ministry chairs and other leaders, as well as all interested members and friends.

Cost: \$115 per person, which includes over night accommodations and breakfast and lunch on Saturday. Full or partial scholarships available. Contact Pastor Tim

Returning to Faith

Admittedly it was an interruption to my walk. The goal after all is to get the heart rate up, work up a little sweat and get some needed exercise. But, I found myself standing there for a good ten minutes, just watching as children and parents jumped on saucers, snow tubes and various means of sledding as they rode their way down the hill. It was only fifteen years ago that we were at the same hill with our kids, snow rising up into our faces, the occasional spill and near miss. We even traversed a natural bob sled run; winding it's way through the woods, looking more dangerous than it ever turned out to be. Remembering my mom as she enthusiastically rode down the hill with her grandkids, I couldn't help but wonder if someday I would do the same.

There are places in our lives that have the ability to evoke a strong sense of connection with the land, with each other, with those who have gone before. It is why it is important at times to stop, breathe a little more slowly and let our spirits be filled with the gifts of that moment. Some would call these places sacred because they find through these encounters, more than a memory of days gone by, but a rich awareness that the joy of all those who traversed that place remains. In a very real sense it is as if my mom and all those other grandparents are still jumping on their sleds, grandkids between their legs, heading down the hill. The spirit of life is present on that hill. Those nurtured in a spiritual tradition, might even call that spirit God.

If it is possible to have this type of deep association with a particular place with just a generation or two of experience, one can only imagine what it must be like for those whose experience goes back many, many generations to the point of not knowing when time began. This of course, is the experience of the Dakota people whose homeland is Minnesota, though they were banished from it following the war of 1862.

For the Dakota, Minnesota is filled with sacred places evoking a deep connection with ancestors, the land, the Creator and all of life. The confluence of the Mississippi River and the Minnesota River is literally remembered as their place of origin, a Garden of Eden place, where their life as a people began. All along the rivers in bluffs areas like Pilot Knob, fresh water springs like Cold Spring and many others, the Dakota people carry an awareness that these places are sacred. Among the places now held sacred is the land just below Fort Snelling, where over 1700 Dakota,



women, children and elderly were held in a concentration camp, following a forced march in the bitter cold of November 1862. During that winter, lack of food, exposure

to the elements, and illness took over 400 lives. Sad memories of tragic loss can also be sacred places, just like the Vietnam Memorial has become for many in Washington D.C.

This past January, Councilman Dave Thune, introduced a resolution entitled "The Year of the Dakota: Remembering, Honoring and Truth-Telling", using language nearly identical to a resolution adopted by Minneapolis in December 2012. Dr. Chris Mato Nunpa, a Dakota Elder and leader, calls it a historic resolution because for the first time language is used to accurately describe the horrendous treatment of the Dakota, such as genocide, concentration camps, bounties, mass execution and forced removal.

Among the important actions called for by the resolution is directing the Parks and Recreation Department to work in collaboration identifying, naming and interpreting sites that are sacred to the Dakota people. This, of course, is just a beginning in addressing the tragic history of the Dakota and the rest of us who came as immigrants. But, it is significant. We all have our sacred places, even if it is only a generation or two that evokes this awareness. It is in such places that we can breathe more slowly, open our hearts and spirits to something larger than ourselves and experience the connections that make us human. By honoring the sacred sites of the Dakota we also acknowledge that our lives are enriched by those places that have become sacred to us.



This is a very direct way to gain information, understanding and courage to establish a relationship with your legislators. Whether you are brand new at this or a familiar face at the capital, you'll discover the satisfaction of being an active part of our democracy.

This day begins at RiverCentre in St Paul at 8:30 a.m. and ends at the State Capital. Buses run between these locations from 11:15 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

You will be fed, inspired and informed about the current situation at the capital, and briefed on the Issues that are a part of the JRLC Goals for 2013. Registration is online or by mail. Early bird rate through February 1 is - \$30 (\$15 student/low income) or February 2 through February 17 rate is - \$40 (\$25 s/li).

On-line registration ends Tuesday, February 19, at 1:00 pm.

February 18 - 20 and at the door cost is \$45 (\$30 s/li).
