

Respectful Conversations on the Stained Glass Jesus Saturday, April 26, 9:00 to 11:30 a.m. Organized by the Stained Glass Jesus Taskforce

Everyone is invited and encouraged to share in this conversation facilitated by the Minnesota Council of Churches "Respectful model called using a Conversations." We will begin with a full breakfast, child-care will be provided, and children and youth will have an opportunity to have their own time of discussion about the stained glass window and what it means to them. Conversations will occur around the tables in Fellowship Hall, with facilitators by the primary Minnesota trained Council facilitator, so that everyone has the opportunity to both speak and be heard. "Respectful Conversations" is thoughtful model for community conversation developed bv Minnesota Council of Churches, with the support of a Bush Foundation Grant. This model was initially developed to help facilitate healthy conversations leading up to the vote on the state marriage amendment. It is not the intention of this model to influence a





particular outcome, but rather to create safe spaces for people to talk with those with differing viewpoints in order to create empathy and understanding while maintaining and even enhancing relationships. The model is valuable in situations where people potentially have strongly-held views that differ. People who have participated in have reported process better listening skills, more interest in other people's opinions, and better relationships as lasting results of the conversation.

The Stained Glass Jesus Taskforce has been given the charge of addressing our Jesus window by looking at art as a medium for explicit and implicit values, how the white racial frame functions in art, how class functions in art, whether this stained glass window reflects the present values, theology, mission and vision of Cherokee Park United Church. The taskforce has been given the twin responsibility of facilitating discussion that builds community while growing in our understanding and commitment to antiracism.

In Solidarity

Our sisters and brothers, families of survivors of the 1980 Massacre in El Carrizal, El Salvador, are supported through our Communities Construendo Esperanza /Communities Building Hope (CCE) ministry. Some of the fundraising meals and food sales have resulted in the constructing of a community corn mill (molino). These photos show residents who brought their corn to the molino and later, picked it up as masa, wrapped in a moist towel in blue bowls, read to take home to turn into tamales or tortillas.

Our local tie to this community is West Side resident, Pastor Porfirio Martinez, who served as their priest until he was forced to leave El Salvador due to death threats. The U.S. government provided millions of dollars in support of the perpetrators of the killings. Deep poverty is the result. Currently, the lack of opportunity in El Carrizal forces young people to attempt to migrate north to the U.S. Many are hurt, kidnapped or killed along the route.

2009 Porfirio In learned the community's dreams for economic Community members sustainability. created a shared ownership co-op. However, without capital, the dreams could not become reality. CPUC and friends from El Salvador, acting on the words of Monsignor Oscar Romero. began to raise small amounts of money project response to requests in including chickens, calves, shoe repair, constructing a molino, and last year, a cement block retaining wall for the molino building, which is threatened by heavy rains in the rainy season.

Doctrine of Discovery Documentary Showing Tuesday, April 29, 7:00 p.m. Hamline University, Sundin Hall, 1531 Hewitt Ave Free, open to the public

Please join us for this showing, a part of Minnesota's inaugural Genocide Awareness Month, Healing Minnesota Stories. A post-film discussion will be led by filmmaker, Sheldon Wolfchild, a member of the Lower Sioux Indian Community, Howard Vogel, professor emeritus at Hamline Law School, and Steven Newcomb, Founder of the Indigenous Law Institute.

Last year, at the urging of the group World Without Genocide, Minnesota passed a law declaring April "Genocide Awareness Month." Co-sponsors for the event include the Jay Phillips Center for Interfaith Learning at St. **Thomas** University, Cherokee Park United Church, World Without Genocide and The Wesley Center for Spirituality, Service and Social Justice at Hamline University. Wolfchild's film focuses on the little-discussed Doctrine of Christian Discovery, the religious justification early explorers used to claim lands from indigenous nations. Based on papal bulls (edicts), the Doctrine allowed explorers to claim dominion over lands that were not already occupied by Christians. It saw native people as less than human and created the justification for killing them.

This is an important issue for Christians and others to understand, acknowledge and discuss with Native Americans.

Several religious denominations have taken formal action to repudiate the Doctrine of Discovery. Importantly, the Doctrine remains a standing legal principal in U.S. case law.

Wolfchild has extensively researched the history of Dakota people in Minnesota and he also has appeared as an actor in a number of films and television shows. Vogel is trained both in law and theology, and has written on the Doctrine of Discovery.
