Community ASDIC Circles September 20 - December 13

This reflective, interactive dialogue series is designed for those seeking to better understand the ways race and racism operate in our lives. ASDIC Circles, which are open to everyone, enable greater clarity of thinking, strength of relationship, and effectiveness of action in addressing systemic racism. Each week participants gather to create a safe place for risk-taking, community formation, and acting with care and confidence. ASDIC Circles are widely described as transformative in their impact on awareness and action.

The ASDIC Metamorphosis Program is led by Okogyeamon, PhD, and Margery Otto, JD, with skilled facilitators trained in ASDIC principles and methodology.

Dates/location: Each Saturday we gather at 8:00 a.m. with refreshments, and sessions are from 8:30 to noon. Sessions dates are September 20, 27, October 11, 18, 25, November 1, 8, 22, December 6,13. (No sessions October 4, November 15, 29.) This circle group is being held at Cherokee Park United Church, 371 West Baker St, Saint Paul MN 55107. Community ASDIC Circles are not religious in nature, although this Circle will meet in a church building.

Commitment: Participants are asked to commit to participating in all ten sessions of the ASDIC Circle. Advance registration is required. All participants are asked to purchase the text: *The White Racial Frame* by Joe R. Feagin, 2013 edition.

Fees: Fee structure for the ten-session program varies depending on whether used as staff development for corporate (\$1400) or non-profit (\$920), or individuals (\$350), and scholarships are available. Fees contribute to the cost of food, the ASDIC manual (270 pages), other programming materials, and stipend to facilitators. There is no profit gained through hosting of the dialogue circles. Congregational Action on Stained Glass Window

The Church Council, after careful review of the Stained Glass Taskforce report and recommendations has taken the following action:

A motion regarding the stained glass window will be put to the congregation on September 28th at a congregational meeting immediately following worship.

The motion put to the congregation will take the form of the following question: Should the Congregation explore alternatives to the current stained glass window?

If the answer to the question is affirmative, then a time frame will be developed for additional questions such as options for change, cost, and timing, all to be explored at a future congregational meeting.

The Church Council also recommends the following procedure for addressing any future decisions about the window: *Decisions for changing the window will be made by consensus* of all those present at a congregational meeting.* If the decision is made to explore alternatives then the motion on a consensus process will be put before the congregation.

*Consensus is defined as a method of deliberation in decision-making where all members have the opportunity to express their opinions about the subject matter before a motion is made. From this discussion, the motion to be brought to a vote is shaped in such a way that all members feel the issues of importance to them regarding the subject matter are taken into account in shaping the motion.

In 2013 the Stained Glass Taskforce was created by the Council of Cherokee Park United Church to explore such things as

- art as a medium for expressing beliefs and values
- how the white racial frame functions in art
- how class functions in art
- whether the stained glass window of Jesus reflects the present values
- mission and vision of Cherokee Park United Church

The Taskforce was charged with facilitating conversations that both build community and enable us to grow in our understanding of the place of art in our sanctuary and our commitment to antiracism. Their work included



a series of sermons on the human Jesus, table conversations in the fall of 2013, adult forums on Faith and the Arts, an evening workshop by Jim Bear Jacobs on art as a medium for presenting particular values and history, and a day of small group conversation. The Taskforce was asked to conclude the conversations with a written summary of what has been learned. This summary is printed below and was approved by the Council at the August meeting.

After substantial deliberation, the Council determined the time was right for the congregation to act before any further deliberation on the stained glass window of Jesus.

Stained Glass Window Taskforce Summary: The Taskforce celebrates that these accomplishments are synergistic and the result of work by other ministry teams.

What has been accomplished during the conversation? What is different?

- · Greater awareness about the racial and class identity of Jesus in the window
- Greater awareness of art as a medium for communicating values and raising questions
- Projection of diverse images of Jesus during worship inviting us to encounter Jesus the way others see and encounter Jesus
- Statement in bulletin naming the diverse images of Jesus as central to our worship life
- White Racial Frame summary approved by Council as a teaching document for elders and new members
- Inclusion of children's stories in worship by Faith Life Ministry that intentionally reflect diversity as central to the proclamation of God's Realm
- Sunday School teachers and Nursery director providing opportunities for children to learn about race, culture and art as they relate to faith
- Adult Forum making connections with race, culture, art and faith through study of Jesus, forum on art, forum on the Accra Confession with connections between economic justice and racial justice
- Greater congregational awareness about external ministry and partnerships and how these relationships are informed by dynamics of race, culture and faith
- Naming the tension that exists between the stained glass window which we have inherited from an earlier period in the life of the church and the current mission of Cherokee Park United Church
- Over 50 members participating in a stained glass Jesus discussion using a Minnesota Council of Churches model called Respectful Conversations
- Learning about and respecting one another's perspectives while talking openly about race, whiteness and the whiteness of Jesus in the stained glass window

Adult Forum Starts September 14

Join our explorations of interesting topics on Sundays from 9:00 to 10:00 a.m. in the Parents' Room. We will start with three September sessions based on Leonard Cohen's poetry, *I'm Your Man*; Cohen is a Canadian singer-songwriter, musician, poet, and novelist whose works have explored religion, politics, isolation, sexuality, and personal relationships. He has been inducted into various American and Canadian music halls of fame, and his compositions have been covered by artists such as Neil Diamond, Diana Ross, Joan Baez, Rita Coolidge, and Joe Cocker.

Disavowing the Doctrine of Discovery: Acknowledgment, Dialogue and Opportunities for Action

Join us for this two part series on the historical and theological truths about the tragic treatment of Dakota, Ojibwe and other indigenous people by our state, nation, and religious institutions. In cooperation with the St. Paul Interfaith Network (SPIN) we are seeking to come to terms with the significant role churches and faith communities played in genocide, crushing native languages, cultures, and religious practice.

Monday, October 13 - Indigenous People's Day - we will host a public screening of the documentary film Doctrine of Discovery from 7:00-9:15 p.m., presented by filmmaker Sheldon Wolfchild of the Lower Sioux Indian Community. Small group dialogue opportunity will follow. This film is appropriate for junior high school aged youth and older.

Tuesday, October 28 - 7:00-9:15 p.m.

This evening's goal is a deeper exploration of issues of history, theology, and trauma raised by the film shown previously. The starting point of the dialogue is the Doctrine of Discovery—the catchall phrase for 15th century papal edicts that gave explorers the legal and religious justifications to seize lands occupied by non-baptized "heathens." It set the course for slavery, forced conversions and the genocide of indigenous people. Discovery was the forerunner to the concept of "Manifest Destiny," the belief that Europeans settlers were divinely ordained to take possession of this land. The impact of these beliefs is not ancient history. By many measures - such as poverty, income and health—the historical trauma suffered by Native American peoples under the guise of these philosophies is still very present today. This history calls for a greater understanding and response.

People's Climate March

There are moments in history where the simple act of many people being in one place served as a powerful catalyst for change—the first Earth Day, a million people at the 1982 No Nukes rally in Central Park, the March on Washington in 1968.

You can be a vital part of a coming "moment" to help the world shift towards a low-carbon economy. On Sunday,



September 21, there will be a People's Climate March in New York City. Whether you come by bus with one of 850 groups—businesses, unions, faith groups, schools, social justice groups, environmental groups and more—or participate in a satellite event (http://peoplesclimate.org/global/?r=credo) you are invited to add your voice.

This march is in anticipation of President Obama and world leaders meeting for the UN climate summit two days later. The Summit comes one year before countries aim to conclude a global climate agreement in 2015 through the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change. Although the 2014 Climate Summit is not part of the negotiating process, countries have recognized the value of the Summit, including by welcoming the Secretary-General's efforts in a Decision of the Doha climate conference in 2012.

The closest march to date is in Rochester, MN, from 12:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m.
