From hot and muggy to high altitudes with less oxygen, Wayne's fluent Portuguese and Spanish (and Renee's ability to nod and smile in several languages) carried them through. Joanne and Stefan



Last year in September we spent an afternoon in Nogales, Sonoro, Mexico visiting Hogar de Esperanza y Paz -HEPAC - The House of Hope & Peace, and other places that served people who have been deported "dumped" across the border. We returned this September to spend time with the women of Casas Adobes UCC and helped them with a successful Fiesta celebration and sales event with the women from Nogales. We traveled into Mexico three times; the first day we helped to serve lunch to the 80 -90 children who come before or after their school day; then Stefan made the rounds of the property, drafting jobs and a shopping list for our next visits. The second week we were unable to go because of the rains - the streets were washed out. The third and fourth

weeks, we brought tools; Stefan began electric work in the shop area used for skill training; Joanne played with the kids and talked with the HEPAC director, Jeannette, and Scott Nicholson, our Global Ministries Missioner living there. Tito made sure we were not lost, interpreted for us and assured us over and over that we were most welcome at all times. We always left with the hope/promise "See you next time."

Needlework for Nogales Children (N4NC) at Casas Adobes Congregational Church UCC in Tucson, AZ, began as a group who wanted to help children in Nogales, Sonora, Mexico by donating handmade items to HEPAC. After doing the handiwork for a time, one of them said"...why not teach the mothers of these children how to do this?" Over two years have passed and their students/friends are knitting, crocheting and sewing, earning extra income for their families. They make necklaces (pictured below), scarves, hats and cloth purses, recycle plastic grocery bags to make small clutch purses, and continue to improve their skills.



Proceeds from the sale of the necklaces are distributed back to the women of "Mujeres Unidos de HEPAC", a nonprofit community center

in the impoverished neighborhood of Bella Vista in Nogales, Sonora—just three miles south of the Mexico/U.S. border. HEPAC strives to create a healthy community where citizens do not feel that their only choice for survival is to risk their lives in the desert in an attempt to immigrate to the United States. Maquiladoras, or manufacturing plants, employ a large percentage of the population of Nogales. Unfortunately, wages in the maguiladoras are very low, only paying about \$5.00 a day. You can support this good cause by purchasing these beautiful necklaces; they are lightweight, non-metallic, and lengthadjustable. Purchase for \$10 from Joanne and at the time of their presentation.

In early October, my mother, Lee Olmstead, and I traveled to Ireland for a week of walking. We are not particularly dedicated walkers, but we wanted to do a mother-daughter trip, and friends who had done "walking holidays" in Europe raved about them, so we thought – why not? The kids and I had recently watched the gorgeous Irish animated movie "Secret of Kells" and so Ireland

was on my mind. It was something of a whimsical choice.



Whimsy, it turns out, goes a long way in Ireland. In the end, we walked about 60 miles along the "Wicklow Way," one of many marked walking trails in that country that cross public and private land. We averaged 10-15 miles a day, spending each of five nights at a different inn along the path (with a few days of tourism in Dublin on each end). A local tour company arranged our lodging and transported our luggage every morning, so we only had to carry a lunch, water, and our maps and guidebooks. That was a really good thing, because although I'd imagined our walk would be mostly strolling along country lanes and stopping regularly for tea, in reality it was a very demanding trek through very hilly, remote wilderness. No tea to be found anywhere. We were exhausted at the end of each day, ready for a big Irish supper and a pint of Guinness.

County Wicklow, just south of Dublin, is made up of sheep farms and steep, windswept, heathered moorland. It's also the site of the ancient monastery, Glendalough, and is, coincidentally,

where Tim and Michelle lived during Tim's sabbatical. Tim pointed this out to me before we left for our trip, and told me what a magical place it is. That sounded nice, but again, I was focused more on tea and sheep in my imaginings and less on magic and early Christian monuments, so I took his comments under advisement but didn't think too much about the potential soulfulness of the journey. Fortunately, Ireland's history and magic are so layered and thick and, well, magical, that the experience became a deeply meaningful one without me even trying.



When people ask me how the trip was, what I say most often is that it felt like home. We don't have any Irish heritage that I know of, so it wasn't "home" in that sense, but rather in the way the landscape felt deeply familiar, in how many of the people we met along the walking path and in shops and restaurants felt like instant friends, and in the deep comfort that was created by the rhythm of walking for hours at a time, just my mom and me, sometimes talking, sometimes quiet, seeing few people and marveling at the details – a




comically bright-red mushroom, the joyful song of an Irish robin, the turquoise blue of a lake.

Early one morning we set off from our bed and breakfast just outside of the monastic city of Glendalough, set in a glacial valley and framed by lakes and forested hills. Our path took us right past the ruins we had explored the previous afternoon, but this time it was early enough that none of the herds of tourists had yet arrived. It was quiet, there was a mist over everything, but the sun was coming in at a perfect angle, and I looked at my mom and knew she was thinking the same things I was – that we were lucky to be here, to do this together, and to be alive in a beautiful world. It was easy for me to see why St. Kevin had chosen that location in the 6th century - it is a magical landscape. And it amazed me to think that even thousands of years

ago when life was mostly a hardscrabble struggle to carve something out of the wilderness, that same wilderness could be a source of wonder just as it is for us today. I am certain that the wonder, awe, and reverence I felt there – truly a feeling of being in the presence of God – was the same feeling the monks experienced. I know that St. Kevin and I shared a timeless experience of feeling that some places, for reasons you can't quite put into words, just feel like home. I can't wait to go back.

It had been a dream of theirs to visit New Mexico, even before they met, and they began to consider being married there as well. When Kathryn finished a hospital chaplaincy internship in August and Geoff finished a contract position in September, they saw an opening in their schedule and they decided to elope!



They were married by candlelight in a 200 year-old adobe chapel. Kathryn wrote the prayer for the ceremony, which recalled a wish for goodness and kindness as the basis of their meeting.

Other highlights of the trip were visiting Ghost Ranch, known as Georgia O'Keeffe country, which is run by the Presbyterian Church as an education and retreat center, and exploring White Sands National Monument, the largest gypsum dune field in the world. 
