Covenanting Sunday September 13


On this Sunday we return to our regular fall schedule, with worship beginning at 10:15 a.m.

This year's Adult Forum begins with a Bible study focused on the Gospel of Mark, using the UCC, *LISTEN UP!* Bible study. You will be encouraged to listen: listen to the Bible, listen to your own questions and responses, and listen to the honest sharing among participants in the adult forum. Trusting in the power of the Holy Spirit, we believe that in that mix of biblical text, personal engagement, and honest speaking and listening, God's word may be heard, speaking words of challenge and words of comfort. Sunday School Resumes September 20

We will be continuing the same rhythm that has served us so well in the past couple years. A letter will be sent out to all parents with more detail in early September. Please speak with Pastor Tim if you do not receive one. We are looking forward to another year of nurturing the faith of our children and youth.

First Sundays - Families Exploring Spirituality, 9:00-10:00 a.m.: This is a creative opportunity for parents, grandparents, and children to learn about our Christian faith together. Topics include communion, baptism, prayer, the Bible, God, etc. The first topic on October 4 will be a sharing of Dakota spirituality.

Second and Third Sundays - Sunday School classes from 9:00-10:00 a.m.: Sandy Dodson and Sophie LeMeur will lead children in grades K-3 to creatively explore familiar and not so familiar stories in the Bible. Andy George leads youth in grades 4+ to examine scripture, paying particular attention to central claims of our faith. We intentionally link social justice themes with the ministries of the church.

Fourth Sundays – Making Music in Church: From 9:15-9:45 a.m., Jen Folkers and Andy Barnett introduce children and youth to a song that will be part of the morning worship service and also talk about how and from where these songs originate. You are welcome to bring your child/ren at 9:00. At 9:45 they are invited to find a game in the Kid's Corner. We welcome parental volunteers to help with this time before worship begins.

Super Fellowship Sunday, September 20

On this Sunday, after worship, the Fellowship Ministry will be lifting up the importance of the fellowship hour in building community and creating a place of welcoming for those who are new.

Members also will be invited to sign up to help host a fellowship hour one or more times during the coming year. Hosting includes helping prepare a snack to be shared, setting-up the serving tables, and clean-up. New volunteers will be paired with experienced members. The standard for refreshments is simple snacks or treats, homemade or purchased, but more elaborate or creative ideas are also welcome, and expenses are reimbursed.

Fellowship Ministry will also be asking folks to make an extra donation to create a cash fund. There is no budgeted income other than the good will donation received at fellowship hour and sometimes we need a bit extra to cover all expenses.

We Pray for Our Brothers and Sisters in El Carrizal

From Pastor Porfirio: Hello Joy! About a week ago I spoke to Juan Hernandez, leader of Communities Building Hope (CCE) in San Jose Carrizal, Ostuma, El Salvador.

Violence — Gangs have grown stronger with the incorporation of young people. Of course, it is a nationwide phenomenon, but in small towns, as Ostuma, the violent impact of their criminal actions sow fear and terror in the community. It feels much stronger. In recent months they have killed two policemen of the Delegation of Ostuma. They have begun to collect "taxes" from small businesses. On the roads they stop cars to demand money; they have also killed several civilians. The government and the police initiated actions that are part of a national security project. The parents of these young gang members feel very sad and helpless.

The lack of rain—The production of corn and beans, which is the basic food of the peasants fell to under 70 percent. Even at the Molino Mill business is down because of the lack of corn.

Reaction of faith—God speaks to us even in the misfortunes. This is what could be interpreted in conversation and feelings of Juan. As good campesinos, despite their sadness and pain, CCE members are reacting with faith and hope. Their hope becomes joint action and they have begun to mobilize to bring together parents of these young people involved in gangs and together reflect on the sad events. Together we plant seeds of brother/sisterhood, to support and face such serious problems. Likewise they intend to join in small groups to rent land and plant corn, beans and something else.





