Feed My Lambs Sunday, January 3

As we plan to come forward to receive communion on the first Sunday of each month, we are reminded to feed, as well as be fed. We collect food (and money donations are greatly appreciated) for the local food shelf located at the Wellstone Center, which distributes over 2,500 pounds of food daily, serving nearly 10,000 households each year. 50% of those served are children and 90% live on incomes below the national poverty guideline.



Pastor Tim to be Honored at MLK Community Breakfast Monday January 18, 7:00 - 9:30 a.m.



At the December 10 meeting, the Council approved the recommendation of the Lay Ministries Committee for two congregational representatives for the Interim Pastor Search Team. Barb Herrington-Hall and Jackie Rico will join Council members, Karen Shatek and Andy George who agreed to serve.

We are grateful to all those who volunteered for this important role in our faith community.

The Interim Pastor Search Team will recruit, interview, and vet candidates and recommend the best candidate to the Council. A "Want Ad" will be distributed within the Minnesota UCC conference and the local presbytery to attract qualified candidates. The position will be posted in early 2016 and the search completed in time to assure continuity as Tim retires in early April 2016.

You are welcome to talk to Council members individually or attend a Council meeting if you have questions or concerns. The Interim Search Team also welcomes your input; however, please raise questions and comments outside of worship and education activities. It is critical that our church leaders have time for their own worship and spirit-feeding to sustain themselves during this process.

Birds Tell Us It's Time to Act Monday, January 25, 7:00 p.m.

West Side resident Monica Bryand will present Birds Tell Us It's Time to Act; Climate Endangered Birds of MN on at Cherokee Park United Church. The program is free and all interested people are welcome. More than half of all bird species in North America are seriously threatened by climate change. In Minnesota there are 116 climate-threatened or



endangered species, including the Trumpeter Swan, American White Pelican, Common Loon, Mallard Duck, and the Bald Eagle. (continued next page)

(continued) Monica, a member of the St. Paul Audubon, is an avid birder and photographer. She is working on a special project through National and Minnesota Audubon, photographing threatened birds in both urban and out-state areas of Minnesota. She is passionate in her work to protect the environment for people and birds and will share her photos and travel stories.

Cherokee Park United Church is eager to support this program because of the congregation's commitment to earth care. The church was one of the first congregations in Minnesota to have its electrical needs met through solar energy, and uses LED lighting throughout the building. A recent earth-friendly effort was the installation of a rain garden. The church annually celebrates Earth Day and has done legislative advocacy on environmental issues.

This reflective, interactive dialogue series is designed for those seeking to better understand the ways race and racism operate in our lives. ASDIC Circles enable greater clarity of thinking, strength of relationship, and effectiveness of action in



addressing systemic racism. Community ASDIC Circles, such as this one, are open to everyone. Each week participants gather to create a safe place for risk-taking, community formation, and acting with care and confidence. The book resource is *The White Racial Frame*, 2nd edition, 2013, by Joe R. Feagin. The program is led by Okogyeamon, PhD, and Margery Otto, JD, with skilled facilitators trained in ASDIC principles and methodology.

Fees contribute to the cost of food, the ASDIC e-manual (270 pages), other program materials, and stipends to facilitators. Individual registration fee is usually \$365, but all are welcome to participate regardless of financial circumstances – extended payments possible. Contact Okogyeamon.



Help is still needed in the fun planning and preparation i.e. working on decorations, "setting the stage", and of course, clean-up. Please contact Joanne.


2016 Adult Forum ~ 9:00 a.m. Sundays

Our new bible study, 1 Corinthians LISTEN UP!, provides a rich reflection on what it means to be the church, and analysis of some of the chronic ways in which church health and vitality are undermined from within. The brilliance of Paul's letter is that all of this is grounded theologically; he doesn't simply say, "Now, now, can't we just all get along?" His argument is much deeper, based on what God has done in Jesus Christ. Paul's letter hits on a number of sub-themes: sexual



morality, the place of the human body, food and diet, spiritual gifts and their use, including speaking in tongues, the meaning and celebration of Holy Communion, and famously, in 1 Corinthians 13, love.

The purpose of the *Listen Up! Bible Study* series is not simply learning information. It is hearing God speak. You are encouraged to listen - to the Bible, to your own questions and responses, and to the honest sharing among participants in your study group. We believe that in the mix of biblical text, personal engagement, and honest speaking and listening, God's word of challenge and comfort may be heard.



Cherokee Park United Church Annual Leader's Retreat Healthy Congregations in Times of Change Friday & Saturday, February 26 & 27 at ARC Ecumenical Retreat Center, Stanchfield, MN

Focus: The primary resource will be *Healthy Congregations* by church consultant, Peter Steinke. In the introduction, he states, "The health of a congregation involves the stewardship of the congregation as a unit in itself... The people who are in a position to enhance the health of a congregation are precisely those who have been empowered to be responsible, namely

the leaders...They set a tone, invite collaboration, make decisions, map a direction, establish boundaries, encourage self-expression, restrain what threatens the integrity of the whole, and keep the congregation's direction aligned with its purpose."

Because a distinctive aspect of the mission for CPUC is its commitment to antiracism, the Council has decided to make antiracism learning a portion of each leader's retreat. Friday evening will be given to further this learning and Saturday will be devoted to the focus on healthy congregations.

A copy of *Healthy Congregations* is provided to each participant, included in the registration fee. It will not be necessary to have read the book prior to the retreat; brief summaries will be provided.

Location: The ARC Retreat Center is a wonderful old lodge in a beautiful wooded setting near Cambridge, Minnesota, and is known for superb vegetarian cooking! Linens are provided.

Fellowship and relaxation: There will be time for participants to hike on the grounds, fellowship and just relax.

Who should attend: Council members, ministry chairs and other leaders, as well as all interested members and friends.

Cost: \$120/ person, which includes over-night accommodations and breakfast and lunch on Saturday. Full or partial scholarships are available through Pastor Tim. **Time and Travel:** The retreat will begin at 6:00 p.m. on Friday with dinner and conclude by 4:30 p.m. on Saturday. Those wishing to car pool should be at the church by 4:00 p.m. on Friday.
