Stewardship in Times of Transition

Transition Team Update from Andy George & the Transition Team

We're launching the Church Planning Inventory on Sunday, November 5. This survey will help us gather information about how members and attendees feel about the activities of the church, what we do best or worst, worship, education, theology, and more. It is a vital tool for the transition process and the pastor search.

- We'll provide both online and paper options for completing the survey. Surveys will be entered anonymously.
- We ask that all surveys be completed by Sunday, November 19.
- Transition team members will be here to help. If you'd like assistance filling out the paper copies, we'll be available after worship on Sunday, November 11, during Fellowship.
- You do not need to be an official member to complete a survey. The thoughts and feelings of everyone who's a part of our community are valuable.
- Transition team members will reach out to folks on the periphery of the congregation, who for whatever reason, aren't in regular attendance. It's just as important to get opinions from the people who aren't showing up Sunday mornings as it is to hear from our regulars. If you have friends who fit into this category, please encourage them to complete the survey.
- If you have children who've gone through the confirmation program, whether or not they actually got confirmed, or even attend, we want them to fill out the survey too. The opinions of teens and young adults are just as necessary as our 25 and 50-year members.
- Once we have results from the Inventory, we'll share that with the congregation.

The inventory was created by the Hartford Institute for Religious Research. It's a tool that hundreds of churches have used to assist with planning and pastoral searches. This winter we'll also complete a Mission Study where we look at the needs of the West Side and match that to our talents and gifts as we update the church's mission statement. Keep your eyes peeled for more information on that.

Council Corner - October Meeting Notes

- The Council encourages all members to attend the Congregational Meeting on Sunday, October 29 after worship. The purpose is to elect the Council Class of 2020 and to vote on a Heating System Campaign. The campaign is a fund-raising drive to replace the church's boiler and hot water heater. Information about the campaign was shared with the congregation in early October.
- The Council updated and approved the church's Sexual Harassment and Exploitation Policy.
- The Council began discussion about the implementation of a Personnel Ministry Team for Cherokee Park United.



Greetings from Timor-Leste!
Dear Cherokee Park Friends,

We are writing to personally thank you for your generous contributions to our mission appointment through Global Ministries. We are grateful to be here on behalf of the church as an expression of its commitment to the wider world.

Our work from day-to-day is both gratifying and challenging. Tom has been working on continuing education for pastors in the Protestant Church of Timor Leste (IPTL) while also serving as a local church pastor. Also, you may be aware that Global Ministries has been supporting a rural school in partnership with IPTL. Tom is also working on a research project together with church leaders to assess the impact the school is having in that rural community. Monica's daily work in Clinic Immanuel is ever evolving. The clinic continues to see between 30 and 80 patients a day, 5 days a week. Over the past year, in partnership with its main funder, Uniting World of Australia, Clinic Immanuel has been moving more in the direction of health education and promotion. A lot of this work takes place within the context of regular consultation, but the clinic has also been working with a remote village to try a more grassroots approach. This project has involved monthly mobile clinics and health seminars and helping them reduce open defecation. This past year we built 4 toilets in the community which motivated others to build their own toilets, doubling the number of families that have access to a toilet.

Our goal for the upcoming year is to help the community to reduce open defecation completely. Everyone has a right to a toilet!

Our son Simon (7) is about to finish his first grade year in a public school and our daughter Hannah (13) recently returned from spending the summer in the U.S. and is back to her homeschooling. We're glad to have her back!

Once again, thanks so much for your continued interest and support. We value very much the connection with you. You are welcome to be in touch with us directly if you ever have questions or if there's anything we can help you understand better about global mission or Timor Leste.
