Fellowship Hour - what would you like?

Russ Spangler, frequent fellowship hour host at CPUC, will soon be a welcome addition to a new faith community as his family will be moving by this Fall. Russ has some great



perspectives on hosting the social hour. He sees it as a service he's chosen and believes one should serve with joy. He emphasizes that fellowship is the point of social hour. In that spirit of service, Russ hopes to be a fellowship hour host most Sundays during the month of July.

The current plan for the rest of the summer is to invite everyone to sign up to help in one way or another one or more Sundays. Menus can be very simple, including only coffee, tea, and juice on occasion, or a chance for you to provide what you once were thinking when you said, "I wish they would have....."

There will be options to sign up for one or more categories, including hosting and coordinating, providing the food (reimbursement comes from the free will donations), setting up beforehand, serving the food, clean-up and running the dishwasher. Join with others and form a team. Brief "how-to" descriptions will be available also. It's a great way to meet others or it can be a family project. A sign-up sheet will be available in July.

Transition Team Update from Andy George

Sometimes the Transition Team gets asked, "Why do we need a Transition Pastor? Can't we just hire a permanent pastor and have them do the transition tasks?" It's an excellent question, and one that we asked both the UCC and the PCUSA when Tim announced his retirement. They told us that when churches try to skip over the transition period, the pastor they hire gets bogged down in the unfinished grieving and emotional processing needed by a church after a long time pastor leaves. Long dormant conflicts explode, divisions appear, and visioning for the future becomes impossible. So the pastor they hire to be permanent ends up burning out and leaving after a year or two anyway.

An intentional transition period, like we're doing now, is difficult, but healthy. With a critical and compassionate eye, we've examined our past and the challenges we face today. Being intentional about this process means we can work together to move forward.

Transition Task Updates:

- The transition team met with representatives of the Anti-Racism Team to discuss how our commitment to anti-racism and the beloved community can help shape the church's new mission.
- We're organizing representatives of the two conferences to come, preach, and together examine our unique commitment as a joined community.
- We're preparing a survey for members to take about where our energies are and where we want to go from here.
- With Barb Herrington-Hall taking a step back from active involvement so she can fully support Pastor Glen and his new ministry, we're excited to welcome Sandy Dodson to the Transition Team. Even representation between council members (Karen Shatek and Andy George), and non-council members (Sandy and Jackie Rico), ensures that as many perspectives as possible are brought into the conversation.

Observations since June 2016

Traditions

Can you let go of projects, ministries, even traditions when there is a lack of interest, volunteers, or past their sell-by date? Some of your traditions need to stay; my concern is that holding on too tightly to others will lessen the impact of what you are doing and the energy for something new. I wonder too, is it hard to see or hear the new thing the Spirit is calling us to do? I want to be clear, I am not talking about changing values, theology, commitment to justice - without those, we don't get to call ourselves a church. But anything other than those, need to be held lightly, and sometimes not at all.

Communication

In the midst of all the important things you do here – I hear from those not in the loop – how they do not always know what is going on CPUC. Perhaps more importantly, who is the contact person? Some of that is because there are many ministry teams that overlap. Fewer ministry teams with more specific descriptions might increase participation and prevent burnout. One other point, an article I read in the Christian Century, a progressive well-known magazine, reported on a survey which asked why people come to church. The most frequent answer was that folks are looking to learn about the Bible and how it fits into their lives today.

A Plan

I once asked a pastor friend who was revitalizing his dying church to send me an outline of his plans. He sent me a six-month calendar of upcoming events. Planning and making sure the events are on the Google calendar is important and you do that really well (unless the pastor over-books!) I wonder if it would help if ministry teams and the council went about planning that includes a roadmap for how to get from where you are now to a more desirable future. Yes, that plan will change as circumstances change, so be prepared to adapt and change needs to into the plan.

More Assessment or Evaluation

CPUC is a small church and it is hard to gauge effectiveness by numbers. Every time we do any ministry, we need to intentionally ask: What went right? What went wrong? Why? What we can do to improve it the next time? Is it worth our continued time and energy? (cont'd next page)

Inward Focus

One of the many endearing traits of CPUC is how you welcome visitors. I love to watch the passing of the peace. You are excited to see new faces and joyously welcome them. Even introverts, like my husband, feel an authentic acceptance. Ambassadors are planted to greet and meet and invite them to fellowship time. So here is the question: is CPUC willing to be changed by those who come into your church? Are you willing to listen and adapt your methods (but not the core theology) based on the changing needs of the community around us? Churches that are not able – will be seen as a "holy hurdle" and have a good chance to become irrelevant.

Numerical growth is not the goal. Health is.

I have heard lament, that if we were only bigger and had more people – we would be able to do more and have a better budget. True, but not the goal. You are a small – with lots of gifts and vision and fabulous people and your gift is actually because of being a smaller congregation. Numerical growth is not the goal. Health is. Sometimes that health will produce numerical growth, sometimes not. So focus on the being you right now – and be proud of it.

I expect some of you will agree and disagree with my list. We will both have others to add. And I hope you will talk about it.

I believe you are an important faith community. I experience your vision, nurture, and hope. I am inspired over and over again how much is done with just a little over 100 people. Your worship services are one of the most joyous experiences I have had for a long time. I love and appreciate your values and commitment to a more just society. I am moved how you embrace and love your children as if they were your own. I follow you in how you walk the way of Jesus.



The Council met on June 8 and highlights of the meeting included the following:



Angels Behind the Scenes

Occasionally we recognize various ministries and individuals in our Sunday worship; there are many additional tasks being done on a weekly or monthly, or sometimes daily basis, and we'd like to recognize some of those involved - we know this is not a complete list, so please forgive us (and remind us of the others). Running a church is like running a household - the building needs to be maintained, the equipment repaired, the utilities monitored, the supplies purchased and organized, the bills paid.

Here is a partial list of our willing church angels.

Russ Settevig: Takes out the recycle bins on Mondays and returns them on Tuesday and sets out the trash cans on Wednesdays and returns to behind the building on Thursdays, (Even in the winter!)

Jim Shatek: Studied to pass the boiler operator's licensing; checks the water levels in the boiler room pipes every week; calls in a contractor if repairs are needed; monitors and replenishes all janitor and kitchen supplies; before worship provides liturgist and pastor's water, and water for the forgiveness prayers, turns sound system on.

Kathy Bergthold, Cal & Phyllis Clark fold and mail the newsletters monthly and fold the bulletins weekly.

Jim Shatek: Arrives at 8:30 a.m. on Sundays to check the building and set up coffee! The electricity went off, the freezer is defrosting, the internet is not connected, there is water all over the floor! who do you call? Jim and Stefan and maybe Tom Murphy! Tom also organizes and runs the computerized wall imaging for worship. Jill Jackson: Maintains the candles and other supplies needed for worship and in the pews.

Kathy Bergthold: Organizes the communion elements and containers.

Jan Howe: If you find any hymnals with child's pencil scribbling in them, put them in

Jan's pew as she regularly brings a really good eraser to worship and cleans them up!

Wayne Bjorlie: Mows the lawn, sweeps up grass clippings every Friday, and does fertilizing and weed control.


Jerome Graf: Transports the leaves/branches/grass trimmings to the Ramsey County Compost Site.
