
## De-Greening! Re-Greening!

# Bob's 91st Birthday + Ione Butler = Special Organ Music

## January 13, Sunday worship

Be sure to join us for worship, and fellowship after, as we celebrate Bob Lockwood's and other January birthdays. It's been a while since Bob has been in Minnesota for his natal day and it seems time to celebrate! Besides missing Bob we've also been missing organ accompaniment for many months since we have not yet found a new music director. Ione, our previous director, looks forward to returning for this special day.

Our organ, dedicated in May 2000, is known as the New Century Pipe Organ as it was assembled by the Century Pipe Organ Company. Parts included our original used Vogelpohl organ purchased in 1974, pipes and wind chests from a 1960's Wicks organ from Worthington, MN, and a Jeffrey Hunt organ purchased used in 1998. The Vogelpohl had needed repairs or a rebuild costing up to \$30,000, so it was decided to do this major renovation, adding new electronic relay controls and fiber optic connection. The purchase of \$42,000 included parts alone valued at 75K; the cost was covered by music lovers at Cherokee, with half donated by Bob and Jo Lockwood.

# Council Corner Highlights - December Meeting 2018

- With the help of Finance Ministry Team Co-Chair and Church Accountant Lynne Bates, the Council reviewed the proposed 2019 church budget. The Council decided to wait until the January 10 meeting before voting to approve and recommend the budget to the congregation. This will allow them to know the church's finances after December 2018 offerings are counted.
- The new elders to Council will be ordained and installed during worship on December 30. Joy Sorenson-Navarre (Class of 2021) will be ordained and installed. Jan Howe (Class of 2020) and Curt Fleming, Jackie Rico, and Diane Spicer (Class of 2021) will be installed.
- The Council reviewed the Rolls of the Church. The Clerk, Mike Bates, will contact several people who've not attended in a while and notify them they will be removed from the rolls unless they notify us. (This saves the church from paying Per Capita for these people as well as maintains an up-to-date membership list.)
- The Child Safety and Background Check Policy of CPUC is being revised. The Clerk will bring a new policy to the Council for a vote in the coming months.
- Pastor Joy and the Council are planning a special worship service for January 13, honoring Bob Lockwood whose birthday is January 12. The church's New Century Organ will be featured in the music that day. A special fellowship hour will be sponsored by the Council following worship.
- Council members Andy George, Jerry Williams, and Jill Jackson complete their terms this month. We thank them for their leadership and service.



The Council asks for the prayers and participation of the people of CPUC during this transitional period. Council normally meets on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Thursday of every month. 
Consolation and understanding were given, pointing to the hope that all can be well - we

requests, as Mary did.












## Thank Yous

They used some of the money to purchase a Christmas tree, and we are told this family went from no Christmas at all, to the wonderful bounty carried over in Tom's car.







# Giving Schedule

Throughout the year we are invited to join in various efforts to share our financial resources towards charity and justice concerns. Charity addresses immediate needs of people made vulnerable by society's inadequacies; justice seeks to address and correct the causes of those inadequacies.

**February/Lent:** *Per Capita* - We pay each of our two denominations for half of our reported membership.

March: Neighborhood Food Shelf - both food and money donations

**April:** Loaves and Fishes- pays for the six meals per year we prepare and serve. We have been doing this since 2001!

May: One Great Hour of Sharing (UCC & PCUSA) - supports victims of famine, natural disasters, those needing help during displacement, etc.

October: Peacemaking/ Peace & Global Witness PCUSA - divided between our two affiliations and 25% remains with us to fund our own peace efforts.

December: Christmas Joy PCUSA & Christmas Fund UCC - to help retired church workers who have encountered special needs and are on limited incomes and from PCUSA and to support educational scholarships for youth and affiliated racial ethnic schools. Christmas Family - gifts and money we provide for a specific local family identified through a local school or Ramsey County.

Various Months: Offering boxes contain six envelopes labeled "Communion" which are used as an emergency fund, distributed by the pastor. Funds have been requested and shared with both members and non-members and have truly pulled individuals and families out of very bad financial situations in times of unanticipated medical bills, unemployment, etc.



# New Artwork Acquisition

Member Winnie Williams saw this print at a Taize prayer service and located the artist so we could obtain a print, which we purchased through our Outreach Ministry. We have a collection of various Nativity-themed prints, fabrics, and paintings; this one seemed particularly apropos in today's political climate - a reminder of those travelers who are too easily, and often brutally, turned away. ## Notes from Pastor Joy

If you contemplate the events of the world, it appears nothing has changed since Christmas: The continued embarrassing turmoil in the White House, the government shut down and loss of jobs, Russia's threats with nuclear missiles, and another child has died in the Border Security Detention center - most likely still without their parent. Since I am a dreamer, every year I partly believe Christmas will banish all the bad that weighs heavy.

Since I promised to keep this article sweet and short, here is a story that gives me ridiculous hope.

In Colonial America there was an eclipse of the sun that caught everybody off guard. Many of the state legislators in New England were afraid . . . they thought it was the end of the world. Several legislators moved quickly to adjourn, but before the presiding officer could call for a vote, another Colonialist stood and said, "Mr. Speaker, if it is not the end of the world and we adjourn, we will appear to be fools. If it is the end of the world, I should choose to be found doing my duty. I move you, sir, let the candles be brought." (Lamar Williamson, *Interpretation*.)

The future, Peter Gomes asserts, is a "blessing of God . . . The future is God's time." That has enormous implications for how we live and it has deep and powerful implications for you and me personally. Our future—our time—the time we have left to live, whatever that happens to be, is time inhabited by God. Wherever we go, God will be there. Whatever happens to us, God will be there.

May it be so with us.
