June Council Meeting Notes

- Pastor Matthias will be in the office M-Th, 8 a.m. 3:30 p.m. plus be available evenings for meetings etc. as well as lead worship on Sundays. He asks that ministries contact him so he can meet with each of them this summer and become acquainted with individuals and programs and assess how he might be helpful to their missions.
- The bylaws taskforce presented a proposed change that states the moderator of the council shall be a council member rather than the pastor; the proposal will be again discussed at the next meeting and voted upon.
- A group visiting from Germany is seeking dinner and other connections in the area; our congregation will take a "pass" on this, but will again be willing to host Rev. Lise Sparrow's mission group from Guilford Community Church, Battleboro Area Youth in Vermont as they pass through on their way to a Lakota Reservation.
- Mike & Lynne Bates attended the MN UCC conference: highlights include a talk by Mayflower Church on how 100% of their membership pledges, insuring that their budgeting process is accurate; conference resolutions to urge the Minnesota legislature to pass a law designating Minnesota as a Sanctuary State and to call for racial justice through reparations with ten outlined actions to do so; the decision to sell UCC owned Pilgrim Point Camp due to lack of funding.
- Council was alerted by Pastor Matthias of the First Covenant Church of Minneapolis possibly being removed from the denomination because of their open and affirming stance. Pastor Matthias and council will send a letter of support to them as they stand firm in living out the love of Christ to all. A vote on any action will be taken at the next annual meeting.
- Tomie reports that the goodwill offering of about \$70 from the Transgender Awareness Sunday fellowship hour will be donated to a shelter for LGBT youth; She has arranged for a new CPUC banner to be carried at the Pride Parade, designed by Sandy Settevig, with our new vision statement and the new UCC Rainbow Comma logo. Pastor Matthias and family were gifted with the newly made tie-dyed rainbow T-shirts to wear at the parade.
- **Seeds of Resistance** reports that it will continue the ministry of Loaves and Fishes under leadership from Stefan Sylvander; also it will continue to provide the closing feast at the Mendota Mdewankanton **Wacipi September 15** with help from other organizations such as ASDIC.
- **Dates:** Worship and **Picnic in the Park July 28** (unfortunately the same date as Okogyeamon's installation in Montevideo so we will miss some people) and we can't change the date as the park pavilion (shelter from sun and rain) needs to be reserved a year in advance. **Covenanting Sunday** will be **September 8**.
- Council will go back to original 7 p.m. start time effective in July.

## From Pastor Matthias

A few months after our current president was elected, the graffiti artist Banksy popped up with this stencil art on the side of a building. It was a reminder to the many, many folks who were engaged in resisting the constant barrage of dehumanizing and unjust utterances and policies and actions. Six months into the term and already people were feeling burned out. It took a lot of energy just to keep up with the news, let alone find ways to resist each new affront.



In the life of church, it is also a worthwhile reminder.

Cherokee Park United Church has been through much transition in the past three to four years. The many changes take energy to process, accept, and adjust to. Meanwhile, there is the effort to continue beloved programs, to keep being church, to keep showing up for one another and our neighbors. Some have expressed that feeling of fatigue to me. Others have shared with me that they are feeling as energized and hopeful as ever. Wherever you find yourself at this moment, we all have moments of feeling worn out.


It is a universal human experience to feel tired—both the physical, bodily tiredness and the emotional, spiritual tiredness.

The Bible offers us a helpful and gentle reminder of this fact in God's proscribing of observation of the sabbath. Sabbath is connected both to God's own rest on the seventh day of creation and also with God's liberation of the Israelites from endless toil of slavery where there was no rest.

When Jesus was questioned by the Pharisees because his disciples plucked grain to eat on the Sabbath, his response was: "The sabbath was made for humankind, and not humankind for the sabbath; so the Son of Man is lord even of the sabbath."

Sabbath, holy rest, is a gift from God. It is a way in which God calls us to slow down, take care of ourselves (and let God take care of us), so that we might be renewed to care for others and creation. I encourage you to claim rest for yourself as you need, recognizing it is a holy calling to do so.

## From the UCC website

BOSTON (RNS) June 3, 2019

Three years ago, the Treasury Department announced that it would put Harriet Tubman's face on the front of the \$20 bill by 2020. A portrait of the abolitionist, championed by activists, would replace that of President Andrew Jackson, who would be moved to the back of the bill. (Jackson, the country's seventh president, a staunch anti-abolitionist, owned as many as 160 slaves; his role in the forced relocation of an estimated 60,000 Native Americans, led to the death of tens of thousands.)




Then, in April, the government walked back its plan. The image's redesign likely would not come up until 2028, Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin declared.

But that didn't end the matter at Hope Central (United Church of Christ and Disciples of Christ) Church in Boston. "The U.S. Treasury said they will not," Pastor Laura Ruth Jarrett said. "and we say we will." Since May 2, the church has been stamping all \$20 bills from its offering plates with Tubman's face.

Tubman, who was chosen from thousands of nominations as the new face of the \$20 bill, would have become the first African American on paper money. The addition of Tubman to the bill was planned for next year, to mark the 100th anniversary of women's suffrage in America. After Tubman escaped the Maryland plantation where she was born into slavery, she returned to the South to help hundreds of other enslaved people to freedom through the Underground Railroad. Later, she worked as a Union spy during the Civil War.

Congregant Marylou Steeden said she has noticed the number of \$20 bills in the church's Sunday plate increase since the church began stamping them. "Everyone who does this just gets giddy about it. It just feels so good, like a little rebellion". The stamps were originally created by Brooklyn, N.Y., designer Dano Wall, who has sold hundreds of the stamps online, giving the proceeds to charity; his blueprint of the stamp for a 3D printer is available for free.
