

November council meeting notes

- This month Pastor Matthias held a new member orientation class with Maya Rose and Jill Jackson. Maya will be officially welcomed at a future worship service.
- The Sexual Harassment and Abuse Prevention and Sex Offender policies were presented as completed by Jane Peterson, checked by the Presbytery, and accepted with a few minor format cleanups. Copies of the final policy will be posted on the clipboard in back of church.
- CPUC accepted an invitation to worship together at St. Matthew's on Thanksgiving Eve, with Pastor Matthias invited to preach.
- Membership rolls were discussed and council members assigned to contact those people who we don't see in the pews and we are not sure want to remain on our rolls.
- Council agreed that we would again ask lone Butler to come to play the organ during worship on the occasion of Bob Lockwood's birthday, Sunday, January 12.
- The annual Christmas Dinner will be held Sunday, December 15 at 4 p.m., coordinated by the Fellowship committee. Caroling has no coordinator yet but suggestions for caroling stops are Helma's care facility, Ted Abdulla, neighbors Ethan & Jayden and corner home Jeff & Jefferey, Bill Albertson (& Bob Lockwood if he is not along) at Walker Methodist Westwood Ridge.
- The budget update shows that we may finish out this year with income covering expenses and 20 K left in savings. However, we may receive up to 20 K less in income next year due to people who have left or passed on.
- Pastor Matthias proposed that Council work with the congregation to set 1 or 2 goals for our congregation for 2020. In doing so we would hone our focus for the year and gain clarity about our shared hopes and vision for CPUC. This will not replace other meaningful programs or commitments CPUC has; however, it will help us direct our energy towards a common goal (or goals). Council members offered suggestions, and it was agreed that each person on Council would talk to at least one CPUC member to elicit suggestions and ideas. Other fruitful means of getting congregational feedback are being discussed. Feel free to talk with any Council member with thoughts or questions.

From Pastor Matthias

Dear Friends,

Halfway through the first act of the musical *Hamilton*, Aaron Burr sings "Wait For It." It is heartfelt and aching, full of longing and self-control. Throughout the show, he is cast as a foil of Alexander Hamilton. Where Hamilton is voracious in his appetites, unrelenting in his writing and taking action, Burr is cautious, patient, willing to wait for the opportune moment.

During Advent, we are in just such a season of waiting, yearning, moving towards the fullness of time when God was born among us. The Advent season is a time when we are called to hone our sense of patience. Our yen for justice and peace and love and joy whetted each day, as we move towards God and God towards us. There is a deliberate slowing down to observe, savor, and wait.

Yet, at the same time, Advent is the busiest time of the whole year for many of us. Gatherings fill up the calendar, there are arrangements to make, food to prepare, cookies to bake, gifts to shop for. Errands take on a new urgency, and simply cannot wait.

It is a tale of two seasons.

I am by no means immune to it either. Nor do I have a snappy "10 tricks to ease your holiday stress" listicle to offer. I do wonder about what life was like for those shepherds of Jesus' time. No screens to distract them. No stores to run off to for shopping. No cable news pinging them. They just waited, and Good News came to them, to us all.

May we too experience grace in navigating the season and in learning the deep lessons of waiting.

entryway will still be seen, taking a place of honor as a candle holder. A new rainbow flag has replaced the previous - this one

includes the colors of black and brown, a visual reminder that homophobia and transphobia often intersect with racism - that racism exists within the queer community



just as trans/homophobia do within communities of color. New paraments have been sewn for Advent and Pentecost so now we have a variety from which to choose - thanks to Kathy for her 20 years of sewing paraments and banners. (Lighting and paraments were covered by donations.) Change is exciting, yes?
