Advent and Christmas

As in all other areas of our lives during the pandemic, what we do and how we do it will be different this year, but the heart of what we do remains the same. Additional spiritual focus comes in the form of *Advent Vespers* each Wednesday evening (taking the place of Adult Forum for a month) led by Joanne Sylvander. Many of the *holiday greens* will still be adorning the sanctuary. You will see the usual *Advent wreath candle lighting*, but also new ways of doing that, with video inserts from our members. The *nativity story* will again be told with the involvement of our children, but in a new way. The *roses of remembrance* will still grace our sanctuary in honor of our departed loved ones. We will miss seeing and hugging each other, we will miss sharing food together, but know that this sacrifice is necessary so that when we come back together, we are all there. Advent Candle Lighting

From Pastor Matthias

Dear CPUC Community,



With the holidays coinciding with the highest reported COVID-19 numbers yet, this holiday season may be tinged with more loneliness and anxiousness than many we've known. We may feel some dread or resignation, rather than upbeat energy and joy.

I remember a praise song sung once at a youth gathering where the lyrics proclaimed: "I'm trading my sorrow; I'm trading my pain; I'm trading it all for the joy of the Lord." I tend to prefer contemplative hymns to the more upbeat "praise" style music. But even at the time, something about this song didn't quite sit right with me. Trading sorrow for joy? We're not talking about baseball cards or juicy rumors. Can feelings really be traded out so easily?

The Bible does often exhort us to "rejoice!" and speaks of finding joy in God. But it also contains sorrows wept over and hurts named and lamented. Sometimes these even sit right next to each other. Take Psalms 21 and 22. 21 begins with joy and exuberance, while 22 begins with the writer feeling utterly forsaken by God.

Joy and sadness, pain and gratitude are not an either/or binary. Our feelings are much more like the way scripture captures them—complex, sometimes conflicting, side by side.

The power of faith in Jesus is not some magical eraser for negative feelings. The power of our faith is that in whatever we are feeling, we worship One who has been there: weeping and laughing, rejoicing and raging, hurting and healing. Not just in some omnipotent, distant way, but in the embodied, lived-experience of everyday human life.

As Thanksgiving, Advent, Christmas, and New Year's approach looking very different than most years, be assured that you do not have to feel a certain way. You do not have to feel just one way. Listen to your feelings. Be gentle with yourself and your loved ones.

And know that you are deeply loved by God, no matter what you are feeling.

Council Notes



At the November meeting, the council....

- ♥ received the pastor's report; new items being: meeting with the Worship Ministry and Being Church taskforce planning the All Saints worship and to prepare for the Advent/Christmas season, meetings with the Finance Ministry to plan for 2021 budget, virtual meetings with other clergy doing organizing work around the election to coordinate messaging to our congregations and communities and share resources on voting and values, facilitating a small group as part of the Presbytery's Anti-racism pilgrimage, as well as pastoral care and conversation with members, both proactively reaching out and responding to communications from CPUC members and friends.
- ♥ received a letter requesting transfer of Rev. Tim Johnson's membership to Macalester Plymouth United Church. Motion was passed to grant request, accompanied by a letter of friendship and explanation that, regrettably, a return of a former pastor before a newly installed pastor has had less than a year of in-person pastoring is not advisable, or normal procedure.
- ♥ received a letter of thanks from Running River, an inmate in a Pennsylvania state prison for our support to assist (Chaplain Ammon Bailey) in facilitating indigenous religious practices for inmates; also a request to help publish his book describing his experience as an incarcerated native person; Susan would like to look into the possibilities of this.
- ♥ discussed the church rolls, which is done on a yearly basis to determine whether they are accurate; it was decided that no changes could be made, as during a pandemic, nothing is normal.
- ♥ approved the date for the next (virtual) congregational meeting as Sunday, November 29, after worship; one item will be to vote in the next new council members; Lay Ministries Team is discerning and gathering a slate of proposed new council members.
- ♥ approved the suggestion to start a GoFundMe page to secure funding for Chaplain Bailey's effort in a Pennsylvania state prison. We anticipate a contribution from Native inmates who won a settlement after being denied the free expression of their Native religious beliefs, and will seek to raise \$5,000 to fund sweat lodges and Native religious ceremonies for these inmates.
- ♥ received a report from the Faith Life Ministry that Sophie LeMeur will be spearheading the production of a video montage of the nativity story, involving families and children in the congregation.
