# Christmas Cookie Bake Day

# December 10, Saturday, 2 pm

Children of all ages are invited to a holiday cookie bake in the Cherokee Park church basement. 2:00pm is the start time and the ending time is whenever your desire to bake cookies has had its run.

There will be several ways for you to participate. You choose. You can prepare your cookie dough at home and bring it to the kitchen, where a huge selection of Christmas and outdoorsy cookie cutters will be available for your use. If you want to use your own favorite cutter, bring it, but you are responsible for getting it home again. You can bake your cookies there or take them home to bake. If you want to teach others to make your favorite dough, you can bring all of the necessary ingredients and whip it up at the church kitchen.

There will be sugar cookie dough available for your use at the kitchen which will require no effort from you other than to roll out and cut. Please advise us if you plan to use this option, as we will need to have sufficient dough on hand.

Other accoutrements such as colored sugar and frosting will be available in limited quantities. If you plan to cut and/or bake at the church kitchen, bring the following for your use: rolling pin; timer; cookie sheets; waxed paper. Some kind of plastic protective sheeting to use while rolling out would also be useful. Other holiday products such as edible wreathes may be manufactured that day, too.

Please, please, let us know if you plan to attend on December 10. Who is coming? What are their ages? (or approx.) Do they want to use our ready-made dough? Do they like to eat cookies? You can send an email to either Diane or Wayne to let them know your plans for December 10.

### From Pastor Matthias

### Dear CPUC,

While I am so grateful that vaccines have opened up many more opportunities for seeing each other this Advent and Christmas season, I do want to hold onto the slower pace of the holidays that I experienced the past two years with fewer holiday gatherings or gift exchanges or other seasonal events.



A writer and fellow pastor, Mary Ann McKibben Dana, recently wrote that the period from Thanksgiving to New Year's feels like doing a 500-piece puzzle but having 600 pieces in the box. Not everything fits or belongs. Add in the grief that can swell around the holidays, and it really can be just too much.

My nudge to you this month is this: be gentle with yourself. You do not have to fill every available moment with chores, people, gatherings. You are not obligated to feel cheerful if you are overcome by a wave of sadness. You do not need to stretch yourself thin getting gifts for every acquaintance or person you think might get you a gift.

If the point of this season is moving us towards God's incarnation as a child born to two exhausted parents, then I believe God invites us to let our own faith be one that is tender with others and with ourselves. It is a faith that encourages the afternoon nap you are contemplating. It is the faith that listens to your body and its needs: connection or solitude, a glass of water or another piece of pie, a day to lounge in pjs or the energy to tackle a project.

Let us take a cue from the newborn Christ child and tend to those most basic of needs: rest, touch and connection, warmth, sustaining food. Let's not try to cram 100 extra puzzle pieces in where they don't fit, and even more so, I promise you'll be fine if the puzzle doesn't get completed. God, Immanuel, will still draw near.

# At the October Meeting the Council...

- accepted the <u>pastor's monthly report</u>. Items not recurring on a monthly basis were the 3-4 cases of people contacting CPUC for *emergency assistance*, such as needing help with advance renters' damage deposits which might prevent them from being able to secure housing. Pastor Matthias also does referrals to other local assistance resource programs. He has now created an information form for requests to help speed up the process and clarify the needs. Thanks to the generosity of members this emergency account is presently adequately funded.
- reviewed the membership rolls to determine whether people who are not involved in any way should remain on; those in question were divided among council members to contact and ask if they wished to remain on the rolls. This should be done annually but was not done during the pandemic when no one was encouraged or allowed to be together in the building or elsewhere.
- discussed how the church holds strategic plans (such as outreach or council visioning) in relation to the Seasonal Steering Team model, which is less conducive to those longer-term needs.
- discussed an idea put forth by the <u>Finance Team</u> to include in our stewardship response, an effort to discern our possible duty for *Reparations* (to indigenous people and others of color). This could be a focus started during Lent which is always a good place to look to the past, present, and future. Five members attended a four-part series on this topic earlier in the year, and the same organizers of that zoomcast are also available as resource.
- received a report from <a href="Property Management">Property Management</a> that small and large repairs continue in this older building. Curt recently fixed one of the kitchen sink stoppers. The <a href="Tech Team">Tech Team</a> is now creating more flexibility as some of the team also wish to be involved in the music ministry on Sundays.
  - received a report from <u>Lay Ministry</u> that the second *Seasonal Steering Team* will meet soon and make plans for Jan-Feb-Mar. The Fall team is going well and excited about a cookie baking event on Saturday Dec 10. Also a *new church treasurer* is needed as Phyllis C. wishes to retire from that role. (Thank you, Phyllis, for many years of service.) This has evolved into an easier task recently as most bills are now paid automatically online.
- received a report from the <u>Personnel Team</u> that they have updated the job description for a *nursery coordinator* and put it out to various church areas. It was suggested to also post in local coffee shops & restaurants and contact WSCO.

Introducing Cubies and their fabricator Carly

After following up a lead for a commerciallysold air-filtering system, Carly discovered this DIY ("Corsi") system online, which has been studied and tested by various labs and found to be effective in filtering out most of the covid viruses.

If you would rather see air filters and interesting duck tape than grey metal, and if you'd like to spend \$150 instead of \$2000, you are in luck, as this is what we chose!! (Actually a member contributed to pay for Cubie 1!)

Cubie 1, Cubie 2, and Cubie 3 are completed and working, with Cubie 4 yet to be assembled. They will be gently filtering air for us in our worship and social spaces.


