Our music is of many genres, including classic church hymns, global music repertoire, contemporary vocal arrangements, jazz, and folk music.

#### **EASTER SUNDAY SPECIAL MUSIC**

The Ensemble Singers will offer two selections for Easter Sunday. Our Easter selection will be "Oh Happy Day," and we will also honor Trans Day of Visibility by offering an arrangement of "For All The Children." Please join us at CPUC on March 31 for a vibrant morning of music! Lend your own singing voice to our all-sing hymns and celebrate the Risen Christ.

Our general schedule: Rehearsals on most Wed. evenings, Sept. through May, 6:30 to 8 p.m. We have "singing Sundays" once or twice per month, with special worship services added periodically, Sept. through May, with a summer recess. Emails go out regularly to keep members in the loop on schedule changes, song selections, and upcoming plans.

Some of our members read music, while others do not. Music is sometimes written in parts, and sometimes in unison. While we welcome anyone who would like to sing, it is not a "drop-in" choir experience. We seek (mostly) regular attendance, and to grow our artistry and skills over time, as a team of musicians.

Please confirm your plans to attend a rehearsal, a couple days in advance, and to confirm that a rehearsal is happening on the night you plan to attend. Would you be more likely to come, if you could bring your young children to play in the neighboring activity room while you attend ES rehearsal? Let us know.



### Food for our Neighbors

This month, we brought another donation of food to Neighborhood House for the food shelf. This was our second donation this year. In January, Cherokee Park congregants contributed 42 pounds of food. This month we gathered 34 pounds, for a total so far of 76 pounds of food. The staff at the food shelf was very grateful, and happy to see our continued commitment.

Let's keep it up!! The food shelf collects shelf-stable items like canned fruits and vegetables, flour, canned tuna or chicken, cooking oil, cereals, and snacks like granola bars. ### Dear CPUC,

There are things we take for granted. I imagine you are nodding; it sounds obvious to write it out. We cannot hold in mind all the basics that we take as givens upon which our lives are built until we are confronted with our assumptions or intentionally seek to examine them.

The Palestinian poet Mosab Abu Toha's writing jarred me out of some of my comfortable day to day recently. His poems are searing and, having lived his entire life in Palestine, he shares the devastations he has weathered which epitomize the lived experience of many Palestinians.

He has buried friends who've died in Israeli drone or F-16 attacks. He has had multiple homes bombed to rubble. His university was destroyed in an Israeli attack. He himself carries bodily scars too. As a young teenager, his parents sent him to the store for eggs. On the way, an Israeli Defense Force attack on a nearby building left him unconscious from shrapnel, waking days later in the hospital. In the most recent wave of attacks that have persisted for months, Toha and his family escaped to Egypt after being detained by IDF.

We like to pretty up hope, sometimes. Emily Dickinson writes of hope being the thing with feathers, perched in the soul which sings and never stops. This is a pretty image.

For Toha, however, hope is much grittier. It would have to be given what he's survived. He writes:

Don't ever be surprised to see a rose shoulder up among the ruins of the house:
This is how we survived.



Toha founded the Edward Said library, gathering hundreds of books donated and sent from around the globe. Often it would take books weeks to get into Gaza as deliveries must go through Israel where packages can be inspected or delayed. It has become a place for children to gather. Where smiles can be shared, along with stories and music.

The current status of the library amid the ongoing attacks is unknown. It cannot be taken for granted that the library building will still be standing whenever the current attacks stop, I suspect the library, as with the people, will persist through the grief and rubble.

### Notes from February Council Meeting

At their hybrid meeting on February 20, the Council discussed a wide range of topics. Highlights include:

- Approval of Pastor Matthias' report which included many "extras" to
  his usually busy workload. This encompassed several evening
  meetings, Ash Wednesday Service, and a Leader's Retreat all in the same week. The
  last of his four weeks of vacation will be July 15 to 21.
- The fiscal agent agreement often signed annually with the Facilitating Racial Equity Collaborative (FREC) is on hold until the organization makes decisions about their programing in 2024.
- Pastor Matthias will talk to some members about forming a team to suggest possible
  ways of changing the size of the Council from the current 12. If and when the Council
  agrees on a recommendation, a By-Law revision and a congregational vote would be
  needed to approve this change.
- The Council discussed the idea of young people assisting with serving communion.
   The Council will draft some parameters to consider at future meetings.
- The Council approved Pastor Matthias inviting the West Side's St. Paul City Council
  person, Rebecca Noecker, to make an announcement before an upcoming worship
  service about the "Yes for St. Paul Families" campaign around creating dedicated
  funding for early childhood education and childcare in St. Paul.
- The Property Management Team reported a part for the lift will be replaced to fix the issue of the lift getting stuck recently. Jim Shatek and Curt Fleming will replace a pipe in the nursery that developed a leak that resulted in water flowing into the fellowship hall in early February. Many thanks to Karen and Jim Shatek for donating a new wet/dry vacuum to the church for future clean-up efforts.

### A few fun tasks to join or experiences to try:

*Money* (from the offerings) *counter*, after worship for 20 minutes, on a rotating basis: contact Karen.

Proofreader for newsletter, (in addition to one we already have), once a month: Susan Assistance for a half hour to re-supply the children's worship activity bags: contact Susan. Liturgist: Ever wonder what the church looks like from the chancel? Curious to try out being a liturgist? Talk with Pastor Matthias. If you enjoy it, you can do it again; and if not, you've tried something new and learned about church from a new angle.



Fellowship Hour: We all enjoy our fellowship time together after Sunday worship. Seems no one wants to leave! But this miracle of welcome also depends upon individuals who will take a turn at setting up the Panera goodies that arrive before worship, and possibly supplementing with a few things. (Purchases are easily reimbursed. Ask

Jim or Susan.) See the signup sheet in Fellowship Hall and volunteer and/or partner with someone else who has already signed up to organize the food or to help with clean-up afterwards.


## PROTECT INDIGENOUS CULTURE & PRACTICES

The inmates in Pennsylvania prisons continue their efforts to regain their constitutional rights to worship in their traditional ways. Many of these practices are denied them, even though some decades back, they had been allowed. Through the court system they regained the right to build, use, and maintain a sweat lodge; the first, **Wanbli Nunpa Inipi**, **Two Eagle Lodge**, is now built at Benner



SCI, actually built by the hands of our members and other supportive people.

Inmates, under the leadership of Running River, are now looking for funds for legal defense expenses, to continue to pursue other religious practice rights through the courts. Filing a law suit costs a minimum of \$400; bringing in expert indigenous witnesses costs much more. (This



is why low-income people do not get the benefit of the constitution - they cannot afford it!) They also need funds to maintain the first sweat lodge such as purchasing firewood & rocks. Donations can be given to Cherokee Park United Church with a note in the memo line as to its preferred use.

Another way to support and raise funds is through purchase of a new book, Forgotten Nation, by Marvin Running River Banks, available in paperback (\$14.95 + \$1.00 MN tax) or electronic version (\$7.99) through Amazon.com. All royalties (\$5.00 per book) are designated to the fund for legal fees. To avoid shipping costs, if you do not have Amazon Prime, paperback books can be ordered through Susan.

(Running River's first book, Our Ancestors Are Proud: a native american prison story, is also available from Amazon.)




### Never a dull moment
