### Dear CPUC,

Imagine being a participant in an early Christian community—in Corinth or Philippi, say—and your little house church group gets a letter from Paul who first gathered you and started your gatherings, teaching and encouraging.



You all gather in the evening around a meal and read the letter aloud, discussing its meaning. You each offer opinions and ideas based on

what you know about Jesus, how you experience God, considering what Paul is trying to convey. Maybe there are debates about what he means by this or that phrase. The night wears on, but you are warm spending time with dear ones in a prolonged conversation.

This is, admittedly, an idyllic image of what was surely more gritty in real life. However, the idea of having one shared source of information and ample time to digest and dialogue is an appealing one to me.

These days, information comes at us faster than we can truly absorb it, give it considered thought, process our feelings about it, or really handle it. The human brain and the human spirit is not made to process as much information as we are bombarded with on a daily basis.

I understand the seductive pull to keep up on every latest affront to our democracy, every new degradation of our humanity, every insult and outrage to common decency and fairness.

This belief that I, personally, must track all the terrors and delve into the horrible details of each and every one, forgets that we belong to each other and we are not alone. There are others with expertise in immigration law, in history, in finance, in human rights who are tracking these terrors too. Collectively, we are paying attention and will demand accountability and justice. You do not have to carry it all or exhaust yourself trying to do the work of a whole network of resistance.

Besides, too much bad news, however, is paralyzing. Do the small bit of good that God gives you to do.

Meanwhile, we gather in church to gather around a shared source of sacred Good News. To kindle a fire against the long shadows of Empire. To be reminded that the bad news is not all there is, nor is it the last Word.

## Notes from the April Council Meeting ...

• Pastor Matthias reported on his ministry over the last month. He spent time on the usual demands of being pastor and duties of his job. He also attended several



community meetings. He followed through on several actions approved at the February Council meeting. They include –

- Purchased the Heartsine Automated External Defibrillator (AED) for CPUC. It will be installed in early April.

- Sent off the \$2250 of CPUC Peace Fund money and special offering collected for The Minnesota Council of Churches Refugee Ministries program.

- Worked with the Personnel Team to hire Eleta Pierce to serve as Sabbatical Administrative support from May until early August.

-Learned the grant he applied for to help pay sabbatical travel expenses was approved by the Presbyterian Board of Pensions.

- The Council decided Vice-Moderator Jim S. will moderate the May and June Council meeting while Pastor Matthias is away. Jill will help form the agenda. (The Council does not meet in July.)
- The Council approved a draft revision of the By-Law governing the Lay Ministry Team. Since the change doesn't immediately impact the work of the Team, the congregation will vote on this revision at the fall congregational meeting.
- The Council agreed to offer a local chapter of the International Workers of the World the use of our kitchen and fellowship hall for breakfast meetings on Saturday mornings. Pastor Matthias will draft a written agreement and circulate it to the Council for email approval.
- The Council asked Pastor Matthias to work with some adult members to convene a meeting of the children/ youth of CPUC. The goal is to determine norms of behavior to follow during fellowship time to keep them (and all!) safe and happy.
- Lynne, church accountant, will work with another CPUC member to investigate the availability of commercial or open-source software that's easier to use than what the Finance Team uses presently.
- Jim S. reported a new latch is on order and new batteries and charger have been installed in the lift. (This expense--\$1,950--was approved by Council via email vote on March 12)
- Tom M. reported that he and the Tech Team have been working around challenges on Facebook livestream in recent weeks to stream the worship service.

- The Renewing SST is getting ready for the remainder of Lent, Palm Sunday, a Maundy Thursday evening service, and Easter breakfast and worship. Work continues to incorporate our new logo into our materials and website.
- The next Council meeting is scheduled for April 15, 2025.

If you would like to know more about any of these items in detail, the Council members would be glad to talk with you. The current Council members are : Jill, Sebastian, Barb, Kathy B., Tom M.,Jim S., Maria, Sandy D., and Lynne.
